UNDERSTANDING AND TREATING THE WORKING WOUNDED

Abstract: Applying the principles of self psychology and intersubjectivity, the workshop explores how relationship to self and other across the lifespan informs career development and effectiveness. The discussion includes case illustrations that offer new possibilities for treating the working wounded. An earlier version of this paper won the national Gradiva Award.

Learning Objectives: After this **intermediate level** presentation, participants will be able to:

1. Outline the conscious and unconscious meanings of work
2. Identify and make use of the concept of core selfobject needs and experiences in relation to career development
3. Use a model of early selfobject experiences to enhance an analytic therapist's effectiveness in treating work related issues
4. Apply emotional organizing principles to treating the psychological context of work and career
5. Identify how an analyst's own professional selfobject experiences and needs influence the analytic relationship
